Tribute to Katherine (Katy) Talati

It is with much sadness that I report the passing of our dear friend and supporter, Katy Talati. Those of us who were lucky enough to know Katy were enchanted by her delightful personality and fascinated by her amazing life. Born in Peking, Katy was a talented painter of Chinese landscapes and mythology and her works were exhibited at several British museums.

As the Guardian newspaper said: "She was taught to view the world through "Chinese eyes" by her beloved teacher, Prince Pu Quan, as a young woman growing up in Beijing (then Peking) in the 1930s and 40s. He was a leading classical landscape painter, and a great-grandson of the 19th-century emperor Daoguang and cousin of the last emperor, Pu Yi.

Katherine came from a wealthy Indian Parsee background and had strong ties to Britain. Her parents had earlier moved to Beijing....... She grew up in a privilegedhome in the Legation Quarter, next to the Tartar City wall and attended the Peking American School, while also privately studying painting with Pu Quan. He taught her not only the techniques of the Chinese arts, but also formed

her philosophy and outlook on life. After the Japanese occupation, Katherine was imprisoned in Weihsien internment camp The civil war that resumed after the end of hostilities, and growing social and political instability, led to the family's departure from China. Katherine left for London in 1948, at the age of 26, to return only once to the country of her birth, for a brief visit in 2002."

Katy worked until retirement in the Foreign and Commonwealth Office. With her great respect for her old teacher, she managed, in 2004, to encourage a major retrospective of Pu Quan's work at the Ashmolean Museum.

In later life, Katy's sight unfortunately deteriorated, but she maintained a strong sense of independence, with which we were keen to assist her. In return, Katy has been very kind to OAB, leaving a generous gift in her Will, helping us to continue to provide our services to others with sight loss. Katy was always great company: her intellect and good humour made the time pass very quickly. We will miss her very much. Colin Cure.

Mel's Story



In April it will be two years since I lost all of my sight... overnight! Anybody reading this will know how debilitating and heartbreaking sight loss can be, for both the afflicted and the people close to them. So I thought it would be nice to write about some of the good things I've experienced since losing my sight.

Truly, the loss restored my faith in human kindness. It opened my heart to the depth of my family's love, how caring friends can be, and introduced me to some very special people working in our hospitals. I tried to ignore my blinded eyes, as I focused

on rebuilding my strength. I can't believe it now, but I was very ill. I couldn't move my head let alone get out of bed! After some pretty intense physiotherapy I eventually made it back onto my feet! It was only after I finished treatment for a tumour that I realised this blindness thing was permanent. I desperately needed to talk to somebody. I found her in the OAB. I will be forever grateful for the time spent talking with Judith. She understood exactly how I felt, offered a sympathetic ear whilst also sharing practical advice about living day to day with no sight. I hope she continued overleaf >>> knows how much I admire and care about her.

In February I travelled to Norfolk to take part in various activities with other visually impaired young adults. We went biking, canoeing, climbing, swung between trees and navigated a terrifying high rope course. most challenging The rewarding moment for came in the cave! It involved clambering under, over and throughsome very tight spaces! I was head first into a tunnel so shallow I was crawling through completely flat on my stomach. It was strenuous and I panicked. But there was no escape. The only option was to carry on! Luckily adrenaline kicked in, as I shuffled and shifted through the long tunnel bruising my elbows and knees with every turn. It was a struggle, but so satisfying when I made it! I was reminded of our innate power to persevere through situations that seem insurmountable at the time. The tunnel is a bit like the challenge of losing sight. There is no turning back. There will be moments of panic and pain. But if you stay strong and take one step at a time you'll eventually find your way back into the light.

The Sensory Garden in Bury Knowle Park

So 5 members of the Friends of Bury Knowle Park, Headington, met at the Sensory Garden in Bury Knowle Park. The task was to clear the raised flower beds of the Winter weeds, turn over the soil and add compost in preparation for planting the various plants selected by Robert Jacob, Head Gardener at Waterperry Gardens. Bob is the garden artist who creates the picture through the plants he selects and for the Sensory Garden there is the added many different bonus of fragrances. The plants are selected for their different shades of green and leaf textures and once in flower for the added colours of the blooms. As well as Lavenders, Bob has included many herbs and so the area will also smell like a kitchen garden. During the next few weeks the plants will take root, spread and grow and by the Summer there will be plenty of colour and a heavy

Have you the IT skills to help OAB?

We're looking for new volunteers for two projects. In both cases, you need to be a confident and competent user of IT. The projects are:

Computer Support. Volunteers make home visits to people who have started to find it difficult to see their computer screen. A few fairly simple adaptations can make a huge difference and often mean the person you visit will be able to carry on using their computer. A visit usually takes an hour or two.

This project covers all Oxfordshire, so it doesn't matter where you live in the county. Computer Support volunteers usually make just one visit, at a time agreed between the volunteer and person visited, which the include weekends and evenings. So this role might suit if you work full-time during the week. You need an understanding of how a computer works, but are not expected to make fundamental changes.

IT Training. Volunteers work one-to-one with people who need help. This could be

with a computer, tablet or smartphone, and at any level – from people who are beginners to experienced users whose needs are changing with their vision. The training takes place at OAB in Oxford.

Volunteers for this project need to be available on a weekday – any day, for at least two hours – and within reach of OAB (Abingdon Road, near Redbridge Park & Ride). We're looking for regular, confident users of IT rather than experts - though people with more advanced knowledge are very welcome. You also need patience and good communication skills.

For all our volunteers, we reimburse travel expenses and provide training. For IT trainers, this may include training in specialist software. We also have regular get-togethers, usually a combination of training and social, of volunteers from both projects.
