Land's End to John O'Groats by coast by Colin Cure

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As Imentioned in my introductory article, I am most grateful to all of those who kindly supported me for the last leg of my cycle ride from Land's End to John O'Groats.

It has been a wonderful experience. I set off from Land's End over 10 years ago and most years I've completed successive stages around our beautiful coastline. I've been joined by different friends on most stages, so I've had plenty of company. The cycling has been tough from time to time. Perhaps the toughest being the roller-coaster hills of the final stage, particularly up the west coast of the Highlands. Mind you, the rewards, in terms of the spectacular scenery huge mountains, crystal clear lochs and golden beaches made it all worthwhile. I've met some very friendly people and learned a lot about the nation - the little museum about the Transporter Bridge in Newport, South Wales, was a delight. I've also been privileged to see some special wildlife, including





seals, dolphins, otters and eagles. It's difficult to pick the highlights, as it was all so enjoyable. Two contrasting highlights, however, would be coming in to Liverpool on the Mersey Ferry from the Wirral, and cycling along the remote Ardnamurchan Peninsular in Scotland.

Before you ask, yes, I am planning on continuing around the coastline. I've already started, if I count the 17 miles down to Wick, after taking the photos at John O'Groats. Only about 2,000 miles to go!

On the afternoon of 23rd June, in an old airfield **Banbury**, near Miles Alison preparing was embark to first on her gliding tandem experience. Alison has been involved with OAB for over 20 years and has very limited vision. This was



her first time going up in a glider and the thought of floating in the air without an engine did not phase her. Alison was helped in to the seat with the pilot sat right behind her, he reassuringly told Alison "stay close to me, I've got the parachute!.." Once everything had been checked and they were ready to go, the glider was helped in to the air by a small plane, a few minutes

later they released the rope and that was it, they were on their own. This was one of the most peaceful and calm experiences Alison has ever had with no engine sounds or noise around them. After some time they gently floated back to earth and Alison put her feet firmly back on solid ground. "I would do it again and again", Alison exclaimed, "next up I want to try a tandem skydive!"

Personal Independence Payment

As you may be aware DLA has changed to PIP. The roll out of this change happening gradually is around the country. Some people have already been through the process. The important thing is to respond to the letter when it arrives in the post. Once you have responded it may take some time for them to get back to you, but the important thing is that the process has begun. 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Accessible NHS Information

The Standards Committee for Care Information, known as SCCI has approved the England accessible NHS information standard (1605). Since 1 April 2016, healthcare providers must identify and record how their patients need to be communicated with and from 31 July 2016 these records should be in place and all healthcare providers must provide information in a format their patients can read: enabling blind and partially sighted people to manage their own health with the same levels of privacy and independence that sighted people may take for granted.

If you require information in an alternative format, or know someone who does, the relevant GP (ie yours or theirs) will need to be notified about which format is required. For more information call us on 01865 725595 and ask for David.

Firestarter Battery?

We are grateful to South Oxfordshire District Council for this edited article from their Outlook magazine

It's easy to think that just chucking things in your grey and green bins means they'll ultimately end up in the right place. Unfortunately not – putting some items in the bin can actually be wrong dangerous. Earlier this year, lithium batteries put in a grey bin caused one of our waste trucks to catch fire. Luckily no-one was hurt, but we did have to close the street while the fire was put out and there was a knock-on effect to the day's collections – all because

of one laptop battery. We have a battery recycling service you can use right on your kerbside - just put any batteries you need to recycle in a clear bag (a sandwich bag is perfect) on top of your green bin on your recycling day. If you have bigger batteries, like laptop ones, just put them out in a carrier bag next to your grey bin on your rubbish day. We'll take them away. For more information call us on 01235 422422.
