A taste of sport

By Alex Bagwell Yesterday I went along to the 'Have a Go Day' run by British Blind Sport, OAB and the VI teams at the Vale of White Horse Leisure Centre in Abingdon, which is where I did VI (Visually Impaired) tennis last year. The event was a chance for blind and partially sighted people in Oxfordshire to try new sports for the first time. The event started with a talk from Alex Pitts, the Participation Officer for British Blind Sport who told us what the timetable was for the day and sorted the different groups out, with my section being the red group. The first activity I took part in was VI tennis, whereby we were taught how to do forehand and backhand moves without the ball touching the ground. I felt that I got better at the activity the longer it went on with most of my attempts going further.

The next sport I tried was VI cricket, which I had some experience of as I had played for two and a half years at Hereford for the RNC (Royal National College for the Blind)

cricket team, the Hereford
Bulldogs. When I was bowling I
got a wicket with my third ball
(bowled) and when I was
batting I hit my first ball over the
tennis net for six but then had a
massive swipe at my third ball
and missed completely and got
bowled!

Given that I hadn't played in three years, I thought I did well in both batting and bowling, even though I did bowl a wide first ball.

My group was then involved in VI archery. This was an interesting event for me as I hadn't done it before; the difference to normal archery is that the target is closer to you and the arrows are plastic. Also, you can see the scores that you get if you hit a certain number with 10 being the highest and 6 the lowest you could score. Unfortunately, I didn't get a bullseye; hopefully I will do better next time if I play it again in the future.

Finally, the last activity that I attempted was rock climbing. This activity I had done before but not for many years and I had a harness on previously. On this occasion I found that I couldn't make it very far

up the wall and stopped after a couple of climbs.

Overall, I enjoyed the experience of trying out new sports and would definitely do it again. I would advise anybody to go along if they're interested in sport and have a visual impairment. They may be surprised at how much they enjoy the experience!

For many people, audio books are a brilliant way to access stories or written content. We have listed a few of the popular services available for visually impaired people below.

RNIB Audio Library

This service from RNIB is now completely free; they provide 3 formats - audio CD, USB memory stick and digital download. Once you sign up you have access to tens of thousands of titles; to find out more call 0303 123 9999.

Calibre Audio Library

Calibre charge a one-off fee of £35; you can also have a 3 month free trial. They provide audio books in

CD, USB memory stick, online streaming and downloads. To find out more, call 01296 432 339.

Oxfordshire Libraries

Your local library will have a small selection of audio books on CD plus they provide a digital download service similar to RNIB. You can find out more from your local library.

Listening Books

Listening Books provide a wide range of audio books in MP3, CD and online streaming; a membership fee applies. To find out more, call 0207 407 9417.

Online Services

You can now get audiobooks through Amazon's audible service, Apple iTunes and Google Play; just search the internet to find out more.

Local Shops

A range of book shops stock audio books on CD plus charity shops also have a large selection. We even have some at OAB.




Back on the bike

David Baxter, 71 and from Abingdon, has been visually impaired for over 30 years due to a detached retina. Three years ago when he joined ActivEyes, he hopped on a bike for the first time since he lost his sight, and David has not looked back! When he joined ActivEyes, he started off going to the Wheels for All cycling events at Horspath running track every other week; now, his cycling has improved so much he does not stop for a break! David also enjoys going to the VI tennis sessions in Abingdon and also the pub meets. He says "This is a great opportunity to meet other visually impaired people... you get to know small tricks and everyone understands what you're going through, plus going to cycling and tennis helps keep me fit. OAB and ActivEyes have helped me stay as independent as possible." David has also taken part in sports taster days and even had a go at rock climbing. He's

a keen gardener and a season ticket holder for Oxford United.




