Judith Wood

Judith Wood, OAB's dearly-loved Senior Sight Advisor and Counsellor, died on April 17th, just 2 months after her 70th birthday. For over twenty-five years, Judith worked tirelessly for OAB – establishing a full-time Sight Advisory Service at the Oxford Eye Hospital as well as the county's only specialist counselling service for those living with sight loss. Her contribution to mental health provision for blind and partially sighted people has been truly remarkable.

Although Judith faced illness in her later years, she was very athletic in her youth. In the 1960s she was a semi-finalist in the junior Wimbledon tennis championships, and she was also an accomplished horse rider. Judith's father was in the



RAF and she spent a lot of her childhood overseas. She started her career as a nurse in the RAF where she met her future husband, who was a pilot. At the age of 24, Judith lost the sight in one eye in a road traffic accident. Despite this, she continued nursing for many years, eventually reaching the rank of flight lieutenant in the RAF nursing service.

After the sight in her other eye started to fail, Judith qualified as a psychotherapist whilst working at the Princess Mary Unit at RAF Holton near Aylesbury.

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In her role at OAB, Judith helped thousands of people with sight loss. Judith had around 600 client appointments per year (in person and by phone) and the sight desk that she established now has around 600 visitors annually. Judith strove to ensure that no one with sight loss would have to face the

lack of support that she had herself faced as a young woman.

Judith abounded with empathy and compassion, and her own experience of visual impairment gave her exceptional insight into the challenges that her clients faced.

Even her total sight loss in 2016 did not diminish her unremitting enthusiasm for helping others. Judith accepted her own sight loss with equanimity and showed great devotion to the needs of others by going well beyond her call of duty at OAB; in so doing, she became emblematic of a true charity worker. She was a highly inspirational counsellor, mentor, colleague and friend.

Last year, Judith's achievements culminated in her receiving a prestigious 'British Citizen Award.' She was also one of just three winners out of over 1,000 nominees in Radio 4's 'All in the Mind' mental health awards. Marion Janner OBE, presenting the award, described Judith as "Somebody who exemplifies what is wonderful about the best

professionals which is that in themselves they are inspiring role models; they are able to see what we can do – our skills, our talents, our dreams."

Hundreds of people with sight loss are exceedingly grateful for all that Judith did for them, and many have said that her support has "transformed" or even "saved" their lives. Judith's legacy will no doubt live on in this way and in our continued work at OAB.

Judith was wise and compassionate beyond words. Her presence, wit and laughter will be greatly missed. We extend our deepest sympathies to her husband Trevor and her son James and his fiancée Nadia.

Memories of Judith

Below are a few memories of Judith; sadly we can't fit them all in, but if you have any fond memories and of how she may have helped you please do contact us to let us know:

"In January 2016 I was in the depths of despair. My father had been diagnosed with vascular dementia. The slow degeneration of my central vision had picked up speed. My career as a published author of historical fantasy novels for teenagers was in the doldrums. And my partner of 15 years had just ended our relationship by email. I might, now, be looking back at that dark time wondering how on earth I survived it. But I know precisely how – it was thanks to Judith.

When I answered Judith's first call I could barely speak. "I'm here, darling," she kept saying. "I'm here ..."

Judith was there for me, that day, while I gasped, and cried, and raged. She was there for me two weeks later when I finally felt able to leave the house in order to meet her for a consultation at the Oxfordshire

Association for the Blind. She counselled me with compassion, intelligence and humour. Of those three tremendous qualities it is her humour I will miss the most. As the weeks passed, and I began to mend, we would roar with laughter over cups of coffee and I would leave her presence feeling not only supported, but blessed.

Judith was a brilliant counsellor and a wonderful woman; I am a stronger and happier person for having known her." - Julie

"My memories of Judith are never-ending. Her ability to make me see that I can conquer fear, sadness and regret - stays with me. While I live I will regard Judith as my watch keeper. She has helped me not see my future as an end point. Her positivity and non-judgemental words (combined with humour and light heartedness) were and are a warm comfort to me and no doubt to all her family, friends, clients etc" - Katie

"Judith listened, I really feel that. She sees with insight and compassion that few sighted people have the facility to do.

Her sense of humour helps lighten the burden of worries and uncertainties those of us with visual impairment face daily. This support has given me confidence not to pretend when I can't see or to apologise if I am slow.

Judy Baron

Shortly before Christmas 2018, the death occurred of Miss Judy Baron, a long-time supporter and former custodial Trustee of OAB. Judy was born in February 1935 and her life's work had been in Social Services. For most of her career, she was a Senior Social Worker for the Blind in Oxfordshire. She helped hundreds of VI people in the county and was very skilled in teaching Braille. After retirement, she left Oxford to live in Chorleywood in Hertfordshire but faithfully continued to attend our AGMs until last year.

Since the early 1980s, Judy was a Trustee of OAB, she was

chair of the Trustees on several occasions, and was one of only three custodial Trustees who acted as financial guarantors of the charity until it became incorporated. She was also the first woman to chair the RNIB Council and, from 1989 to 2006, she was a Trustee of the Royal National College for the Blind in Hereford. In the late 1980s, she was co-founder with Dr Adrian Hill of the Oxfordshire branch of the Partially Sighted Society, created to provide a forum for sharing information between families of children with VI. After about 20 years, this society amalgamated with OAB. Judy was a very kind and caring soul who was very generous with her time and always willing to help those with sight loss. For relaxation, she loved country walks with her Bassett Hounds. She was devoted to the work of OAB and has left a legacy to the charity in her will. We are all the better for having known Judy, and OAB has a lot to be grateful for her generous benefaction.

Rona Margaret Smith's aim in life to be an inspiration to others and I am certain she has already done that. Born blind as part of the consequences of her Septo-optic dysplasia (she spelt it out for me!), she was learning braille by the time she was 2 and had mastered it at the age of 10! She has lived in Bicester all her life and attended Southwold Primary School, then Marlborough School where she took 5 GCSEs. Very

impressive. She is rightly very proud of her achievements and hopes that she will continue to do well in her BTEC Health and Social Care and her Maths studies at Witney College as well as later at university (hopefully!). Her long-term aim is to help visually-impaired children learn braille.
